

You said

WEAVER and CUDDINGTON

You Said: resident voice surveys received highlighted speeding on the HIGH STREET, NORLEY ROAD, CHESTER ROAD, SANDINGTON and IVY DRIVE.

WEAVER and CUDDINGTON beat team attended CUDDINGTON PARISH COUNCIL meeting to discuss community concerns and MERE LANE was raised as a speed concern.

We Did: HIGH STREET speed enforcement conducted and the highest recorded speed being 35 mph. Evidence has been sent to our central ticket office to process further. CHESTER ROAD - Speed enforcement has been conducted and the highest recorded speed capture was 40 mph

NORLEY ROAD – speed monitoring took place on 2 separate occasions. The highest recorded speed captured being 36 mph and 39 mph. Police warning letters have been produced for all registered keepers of vehicles exceeding the speed limit in place.

Speeding observations took place at on SANDINGTON and IVY DRIVE, no offences witnessed.

Speed monitoring conducted on MERE LANE and police warning letters produced for all registered keepers of vehicles exceeding the speed limit in place. The highest recorded speed being 26 mph.

Speed monitoring has also been conducted on SCHOOL LANE, the highest recorded speed captured being 37 mph. Police warning letters have been produced for all registered keepers of vehicles exceeding the speed limit in place.

You Said: PARKING You said ... resident voice survey feedback from DECEMBER highlighted parking concerns around BEECH HEYES DRIVE, KEEPERS LANE, MEADOW ROAD and BOURNE CLOSE and LIME AVENUE.

We Did: A joint road traffic operation to tackle PARKING has been conducted involving multi agencies (POLICE, CWAC enforcement, CWAC safety officers) around ST BEDES CATHOLIC PRIMARY SCHOOL and WEAVERHAM HIGH SCHOOL following emails of concerns raised from schools, community resident voice feedback and reporting police incidents. Several fixed penalty notices were issued. A quarterly joint road traffic operation is to be planned every quarter.

School parking patrol has been conducted around CUDDINGTON PRIMARY SCHOOL, WEAVERHAM ACADEMDY PRIMARY SCHOOL and THE RUSSETT SCHOOL. No offences witnessed.

Parking patrol has been conducted on WEST ROAD and LEIGH WAY following concerns raised by WEAVERHAM PARISH COUNCIL. Further patrols will be made. Support from CWAC enforcement officers has also been requested.



Community Speedwatch

Following the funding from our Crime commissioner Mr John DWYER, speed devices were purchased to help keep our roads safe. One of these devices will be used regularly by our newly formed DUTTON community speed watch group who have all received their training from CWAC. CWAC Cllr Lynn GIBBON and WEAVER and CUDDINGTON beat team made a site visit to support the DUTTON community speed watch group.

Last month WEAVER and CUDDINGTON beat team attended CUDDINGTON PRIMARY SCHOOL to discuss with junior safety officer's monthly topics SEAT BELTS, CAR SEATS, ONLINE SAFETY.

The junior safety officers were tasked in organising a poster competition re SEAT BELTS and CAR SEATS for the whole school to participate. Junior safety officers have delivered an interactive online safety quiz to their peers and choose the top 3 favourite posters in prepare for another future road safety initiative. Well done to all!!

WEAVER and CUDDINGTON beat team attended PETTY POOL COLLEGE to deliver a presentation 'SAFETY AROUND DOGS' where the students discussed personal behaviour around dogs and the importance of seeking permissions to touch an unknown dog. From the owner. Students especially enjoyed their session with therapy dog 'CHERRY'.

WEAVERHAM ACADEMDY PRIMARY SCHOOL year 5/6 pupils have now practised their mini police promise as a whole class in preparation for their passing out parade next week. Well done to all!!

WEAVER and CUDDINGTON beat team attended WEAVERHAM FOREST STREET SCHOOL discussing with pupils online safety and age appropriate social platform apps.

TRUCAM

Our trucam device has been sent away for the past several weeks being calibrated so a weekly enforcement couldn't be conducted within our ward. However, speed enforcement had been conducted prior and since the device return on the HIGH STREET, highest recorded speed being 35 mph and CHESTER ROAD, highest recorded speed 40 MPH. All offences captured have been processed for our central ticket office to progress further.



PARKING

FRAUD

Posters have been distributed around our ward with an important message from CHESHIRE CONSTABULARY 'The Police will <u>never</u> ask you to withdraw money. These posters have been placed in LIME AVENUE POST OFFICE, SPAR POST OFFICE, TESCO and COOP stores near cash withdrawal machines.

Courier fraud occurs when a fraudster contacts victims by telephone purporting to be a police officer or bank official. The caller might be able to confirm some easily obtainable basic details about the victim such as their full name and address.

The caller may also offer a telephone number for the victim to telephone or ask the victim to call the number on the back of their bank card to check that they are genuine.

In these circumstances, either the number offered will not be genuine or, where a genuine number is suggested, the fraudster will stay on the line and pass the victim to a different individual.

The fraudster will then suggest;

- Some money has been removed from a victim's bank account and staff at their local bank branch are responsible.
- Suspects have already been arrested but the "police" need money for evidence.
- A business such as a jewellers or currency exchange is operating fraudulently, and they require assistance to help secure evidence.

Victims are then asked to co-operate in an investigation by attending their bank and withdrawing money, withdrawing foreign currency from an exchange, or purchasing an expensive item to hand over to a courier for examination who will also be a fraudster.

Be aware -

Your bank or the police will NEVER call you to ask you to verify your personal details or PIN by phone, ask you to help with an investigation or offer to pick up your card by courier.

You should hang up immediately if you get a call like this.

If you need to call your bank back to check, wait five minutes; fraudsters may stay on the line after you hang up. Alternatively, use a different line altogether to call your bank.

Please share this with elderly friends and family as it often those who are targeted.
