

Please if you receive such messages,ring and speak to the person believed to be requesting the money to clarify before sending to an unknown person/number. To report a suspicious text message, report by forwarding it to 7726 before blocking the number. If you've given money to a possible scam, contact your bank straight away and report the scam to Action Fraud - Action Fraud | Police.uk (www.police.uk)

They'll be lots of young people travelling independently in preparation for high school.

It's important they know how to stay safe whilst out and about.



Remember, this applies to everyone and not just young people. Think about the following –

Before you go out, consider how you are going to get home, e.g. Can you travel home with a friend? What time does the last bus/train leave?

Prepare for your day before you leave – consider what you might need. Phone, money etc. Is your phone fully charged?

Update someone on your plans and if they change always make sure someone is aware of where you are. Installing an app such as <u>Hollie Guard – Personal Safety App</u> on your smart phone or consider carrying a personal alarm

Plan your journey – google street view is useful for identifying places in an unknown area before you set off. Stay safe this summer.

WEAVER and CUDDINGTON beat team attended CUDDINGTON YOUTH CLUB engaging with youths from age 11-17 years to deliver an educational input about what county lines was, signs to be aware of for their own personal safety and others around them ie friends. The drug paraphernalia prop box was on display in which various drugs selected were discussed from the display box – LSD, cannabis, cigarettes, alcohol etc. A group discussion was also held around vaping and nitrous oxide and the health consequences of inhaling effecting the lungs.

FRAUD— advise

Do you know a farmer....

Share this post with anyone you know from the farming community.

Thieves will often target machinery and other farm equipment.

There are 3 key areas where you can be most effective in reducing the likelihood of crime on your farm.

- 1. To deter: Measures you can use to make it harder for a criminal to identify your farm as an easy target. For example, parking machinery out of sight or removing the keys and locking them in a safe or security cabinet.
- 2. To delay: Measures you can use to make it more difficult for a criminal to physically break into your building or trespass on your land to take away your property. For example, maintaining fencing, hedges, ditches and gates around the farm building or using an approved hitch lock and wheel clamp on a livestock trailer.

To detect: Measures that you can use to help detect if a criminal tries to break into your farm building or attempts to steal your property. For example, installing an alarm system to your farm office or CCTV covering your fuel tanks.
