

You Said: Parking/speeding was a concern across our ward.

We Did: Parking and speeding patrols across the ward to address the concerns you raised

DELAMERE PARK-LEIGH WAY-MORRIS DRIVE

Also Monday 29 Sept – Friday 3 Oct 2025

I carried out daily school parking patrols around Weaverham High School for the week, with support from a CWAC Enforcement/monitoring Officer.

Our focus was on keeping pupils safe and encouraging considerate parking near the school gates.

What we looked out for:

Parking on zig-zags

Parking within 10 metres of junctions

Crossing yellow lines to park on footpaths

Obstruction of tactile paving and pedestrian access

What we found:

3 vehicles over zig-zags

5 vehicles parked too close to junctions

5 vehicles crossed yellow lines to park on footpaths

2 vehicles blocked tactile paving/pram access

1 advisory notices issued for unnecessary obstruction

Positive outcome:

Many drivers responded positively and relocated their vehicles when advised. The Withens Lane car park, opened by Weaverham Parish Council, continues to provide around 20 extra spaces, helping ease congestion. Thank you to all parents and carers for your cooperation and support. Your actions make a real difference in keeping our children safe.

ASB

CUDDINGTON —1 incident(s)

Report of 2 quad being ridden on farm land in CUDDINGTON. Further enquiries made with the land owner clarified that NO persons have permissions to use these fields. Patrols will continue.

WEAVERHAM—1 incident(s)

Report of a dark coloured vehicle driving around on farm land without lights, believed to be accessing from LARCH CLOSE. Farmer has repaired the fencing perimeter to protect his crops.

BURG—dwelling

CRIMINAL DAMAGE

WEAVERHAM—1 incident(s)

Unattended vehicle parked on WALNUT AVENUE, found in the hours of daylight covered in flour, following an anonymous note left on the windscreen warning the owner to "watch what happens" if the vehicle is parked in this location again. Joint house-to -house enquiries were conducted by WVHT housing officer and PCSO to better understand community issues/concerns. CCTV enquiries are ongoing. WVHT housing officer will continue to monitor the situation.

FRAUD

THEFT (inc from motor vehicle)

ACTON BRIDGE — 1 incident(s)

White Transit van seen parked at the end of a driveway in ACTON BRIDGE where building materials were present. An unknown male walked up the driveway and stole what appears to be mostly metal, including guttering, aluminium fascia and soffits, along with other materials stored in a box. The incident was captured on CCTV. CCTV enquiries are ongoing.

Schools

Key Stage 2 pupils at Weaverham Primary Academy took part in an engaging and interactive session exploring the question: Who are the police?

The session included:

Drawing and writing what pupils thought police officers do — completed before and after the session to reflect their learning.

Watching force videos showcasing the wide variety of roles within the police service.

Learning about the roles of police officers and police staff, and how they work together to keep communities safe.

Understanding how and when to contact the police, including when to use 999 in emergencies.

Next Stage: I look forward to collecting the completed application forms and preparing for the interview stage, where pupils will have the opportunity to share their ideas and motivations in person.

I have attended **Cuddington Youth Club**. It was a great evening filled with fun, laughter, and positive conversations. Engaging with our local youth in relaxed, supportive environments like this is such an important part of community policing. Thank you to everyone who made it a welcoming and enjoyable evening!

Weekly Round-Up: Parking Patrols & Progress around SANDIWAY PRIMARY SCHOOL

Following our Week of Action, I carried out parking patrols at the start of this week to tackle ongoing concerns around school drop-offs and junction safety.

Start of Week Observations:

Vehicles were parked within 10 metres of junctions, reducing visibility and safety. Drop-off bays were blocked by stationary vehicles, causing congestion.

End of Week Improvements:

Junctions were clear, improving sightlines and pedestrian safety.

Drop-off areas were used more appropriately, allowing smoother transitions for pupils.

Community Engagement: I've liaised with school and local parish clerk to request yellow lines at the junction exit and repainting of the no entry area. This proposal will be raised at the next community meeting.

Thank you to all parents and children for your positive engagement and support in keeping our roads safe!





FRAUD warnings





Following on from our recent Fraud awareness days in local banks

I would like to make you aware of a safe, secure and simple way you can contact your bank by calling **159**

often when scammers/Fraudsters contact you they will give you a number to call your bank to confirm however this will just put you through to the scammers themselves.

We would advise that you never call any numbers given to you and to check if the call is legitimately from your bank/Building society

instead call 159, NEVER CALL STRAIGHT BACK IF YOU THINK YOU HAVE BEEN SCAMMED AS OFTEN FRAUDSTERS WILL STAY ON THE LINE AND YOU WILL CONNECT BACK TO THEM, try to use a mobile or wait a minute or 2 before picking the phone up.

If you are at a cash machine and it swallows your card or you notice you have lost your cards instead of waiting until you get home to call the bank do so straight away via **159**.

When you call **159** you will get an automated message asking which bank you require, if you say for example Natwest it will connect you to Natwest securely, below is a clip from money saving expert Martin Lewis explaining how the number works. <u>Martin Lewis: How to call your bank by dialling just three numbers...</u>

The theft of jewellery can be very distressing for the victim and family members. There is often sentiment attached to jewellery that may have been gifted and the loss can never be replaced.

It is important that you protect your home and look after the items in it, especially jewellery. Gold is often targeted, and thieves will always search the bedroom, behind bath panels, loft and even under floorboards.

How you can protect your jewellery:

Storage

Try not to keep gold/jewellery at home if at all possible - consider keeping your gold and jewellery in a safety deposit box. There are specialist companies who can provide this service, speak to your bank or insurance company for more information. If you prefer to keep valuable items at home, ensure they are stored in a safe that complies with your insurers required standard. Ensure any safe is anchored to a substantial surface (brick wall or cement floor) and fitted according to the manufacturers instructions. Think about storing valuables separately, have more than 1 safe but ensure each is protected adequately. Home Security

Ensure all your windows and doors are in good working order. And lock them! You'll be surprised at the number of burglaries that are committed through an unlocked door or a window left open. For advice on improving home security such as window and door locks, contact an approved lock-smith registered with the Master Locksmith's Association on www.locksmiths.co.uk Monitored intruder detector alarms with additional panic buttons, CCTV (including video doorbells) and security lighting can all offer additional layers of protection to your home. Security companies accredited by NSI or SSAIB can advise on the most suitable products to meet your needs. Record and register items

Photograph all jewellery on a plain surface with a ruler next to it – so we can appeal if it is stolen and use pictures for enquiries. Store the photographs in more than one place. Register your property for free at www.immobilise.com Consider forensic property marking for jewellery, enabling the jewellery to be linked to you and returned on recovery. Always take specialist advice prior to marking expensive and/or irreplaceable items. You can find more information on forensic property marking systems on www.securedbydesign.com Ensure an adequate level of insurance policy is held for your home and all possessions.

Communication

Be aware that religious symbols can identify a potential target for an offender. Offenders often trawl through social media to identify and target a victim. Be mindful of what you and your family post and when you post it. Utilise community Social Media Groups / Neighbourhood Watch schemes to share information. Community Vigilance – Report suspicious activity however insignificant it may seem. Does it look out of the ordinary?

If you are a victim, call 101 non emergency and 999 if the crime is in progress or you feel you are in immediate danger. Provide the operator with your exact location and the registrations of any vehicles used by the offenders.
